HAVE CHILDREN?

Know that we have a very special place for your little ones!

The CBC (Children's Biblical Center) has its doors opened 15 minutes before the services at the Universal Church. In the CBC they will learn messages that are appropriate to their age group, have fun and educational activities amongst other things.



How does the CBC work?

The CBC is open on the following days and times: Wednesday's & Friday's from 6:45pm and Sunday's from 8:30am.

When you arrive at the CBC to drop off your child, you will be asked to register your child in our Sign-in sheet. You will receive a card with a number for your child. Please do not lose this card.

If your child is being dropped off at the CBC for the first time, you may be asked to fill out a form with your child's information and we'll take their photograph. This is for us to better care for your child.

Once the service has finished, you may pickup your child from the CBC with the numbered card you were given. We require the same adult that dropped-off the child to return to sign them out, for their safety. We ask that parent's pickup their children no later than 15 minutes after the service has ended.

CHANGED ME!

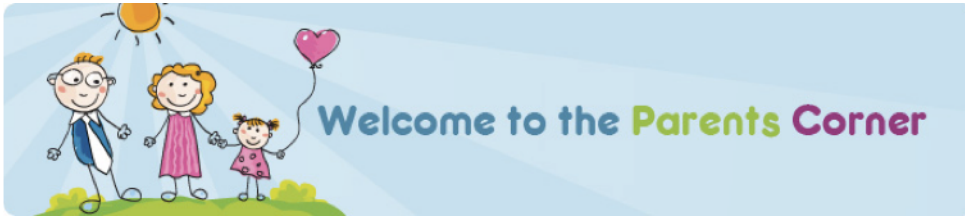

A Child's Basic Needs:

'Affirming words from moms and dads are like light switches. Speak a word of affirmation at the right moment in a child's life and it's like lighting up a whole roomful of possibilities' – Gary Smalley

At least one of the parents should be willing to give a good dose of love, and not be afraid to punish.

Continuous affection at home - hugs, kisses, tickles – including eye contact, listening attentively and smiling are forms of affection.

Making them feel valued – praises, celebrating their achievements, building their self-esteem without allowing pride or selfishness to takeover.

Physical needs – nutritious food, a clean and tidy home, daily baths and personal hygiene, wearing clean clothes and a good dose of uninterrupted sleep every night.

A structured environment where rules of behavior are clearly understood and appropriate punishment is fulfilled.

Creative outings involving activities that are physically and mentally challenging.

Stimulating the brain by listening and communicating ideas – telling stories, word games, learning about objects, places, ideas, people, etc.

Protection against physical, emotional and psychological abuse from within the family or from outside – this includes visiting the doctor when they are sick or injured. But even more, protection from bad friends, music, TV programs, hurtful words, physical contact, negative attitudes and enforcing discipline when the rules are broken.
